



All trails are multi-use during the summer season, except where signed. Stop by the Ranger Station at the park entrance for maps and current trail conditions. Maps are also located each of the parking area kiosks. Wonderful hikes are available from each of our parking areas. Discover Pass is required to park.

Trails

Later development to this day. Later development included constructing the Grand Lodge in 1940, which later burned in 1952, as well as establishing the world's first double chair lift from 1946 to 1949. Today the 5883-foot mountain continues to offer abundant gear-round day use recreational activities with overnight camping available in the summer



1934

Mount Spokane traditionally has been an important gathering place for local Native Americans. The summit of the mountain was a spiritual pilgrimage site, specifically the Spokane Tribe. Recreational development began in the early 1900's by Francis Cook, local ski clubs, and the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). In the 1930's, alpine ski club members constructed lodges, rope towers, and jumps on the south and west sides of the mountain. In 1933, private contractors built the Vista House - a rustic, granite building at the summit that is still utilized

Lookout. If backpacking isn't your style, you can still enjoy the Bald Knob Campground (no RV hooksups). Hikers, mountain bikers, and horseback riders may use all park trails except where signed. Trails may be closed temporarily due to erosion or wildlife concerns. The Natural Area Preserve on Ragged Ridge is open for pedestrian use only. Remember to stay on the designated trail to preserve the area.

During the summer, drive the Summit Road to enjoy spectacular views of the surrounding area. Make sure to check out the historic Vista House while at the summit. If an overnight stay interests you, backpackers can rent the Quartz Mountain Fire

only allowed in designated areas of the park. Snowmobiles, snow bikes, and tracked all-terrain vehicles must be registered, and Sno-Park Permits are required.



Winter Recreation

Mount Spokane State Park is located 15 miles east of US Highway 2 at the end of State Road 206 in northeast Spokane County. Mount Spokane is a 14,000-acre park that is home to an incredible variety of wildlife such as moose, cougars, coyotes, deer, and black bear. The mixed varietal forest provides tremendous gear-round scenery.

Alpine Skiing - The Mt Spokane Ski & Snowboard Park features over 1700 acres with 52 trails, six chair lifts, and a vertical drop of 2065 feet. For the most current snow reports and conditions visit www.mtspokane.com or call 509 238 2220.

Backcountry and uphill skiing are allowed in the park, visit www.mtspokane.com for current uphill travel policy within the Alpine area. Trails begin at the Selkirk Lodge and include close to 40 miles of professionally groomed trails. Warming huts at Selkirk Lodge and the Nova Hut provide picnic tables, a wood stove, and restrooms. Snowshoeing, snowmobiles, hiking, and pets are not allowed on these trails. Nordic trails are groomed Thursdays through Mondays, weather permitting.

Things to remember

- **Park hours** - 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- **Winter Schedule** - 7:00 a.m. to 10 p.m. Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter.
- For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.wa.gov or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited.
- Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.



The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

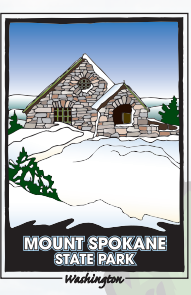
