

Things to remember

- **Park hours** – April 1 to Oct. 31, 6:30 a.m. to dusk camping and day use only.
- **Winter schedule** – Nov. 1 to March 31, the campground and day-use areas are closed. Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.state.wa.us or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- Extra vehicle overnight - \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times.
- This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

- Annual pass: \$30
- One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

Welcome to Lewis and Clark Trail

Lewis and Clark Trail State Park is a 36-acre camping park with 1,333 feet of freshwater shoreline on the Touchet River. Like an oasis in the middle of the desert, this lovely forested park on the banks of the Touchet River refreshes visitors with its unusual vegetation and geology surrounding arid grassland.

Rich in history, the park has interpretive displays with information about explorers Lewis and Clark and original area homesteaders. A large reader board can be found in the day-use area.

Tubing, wading and fishing are popular activities at the park. Rainbow trout fishing is most common in the Touchet River.

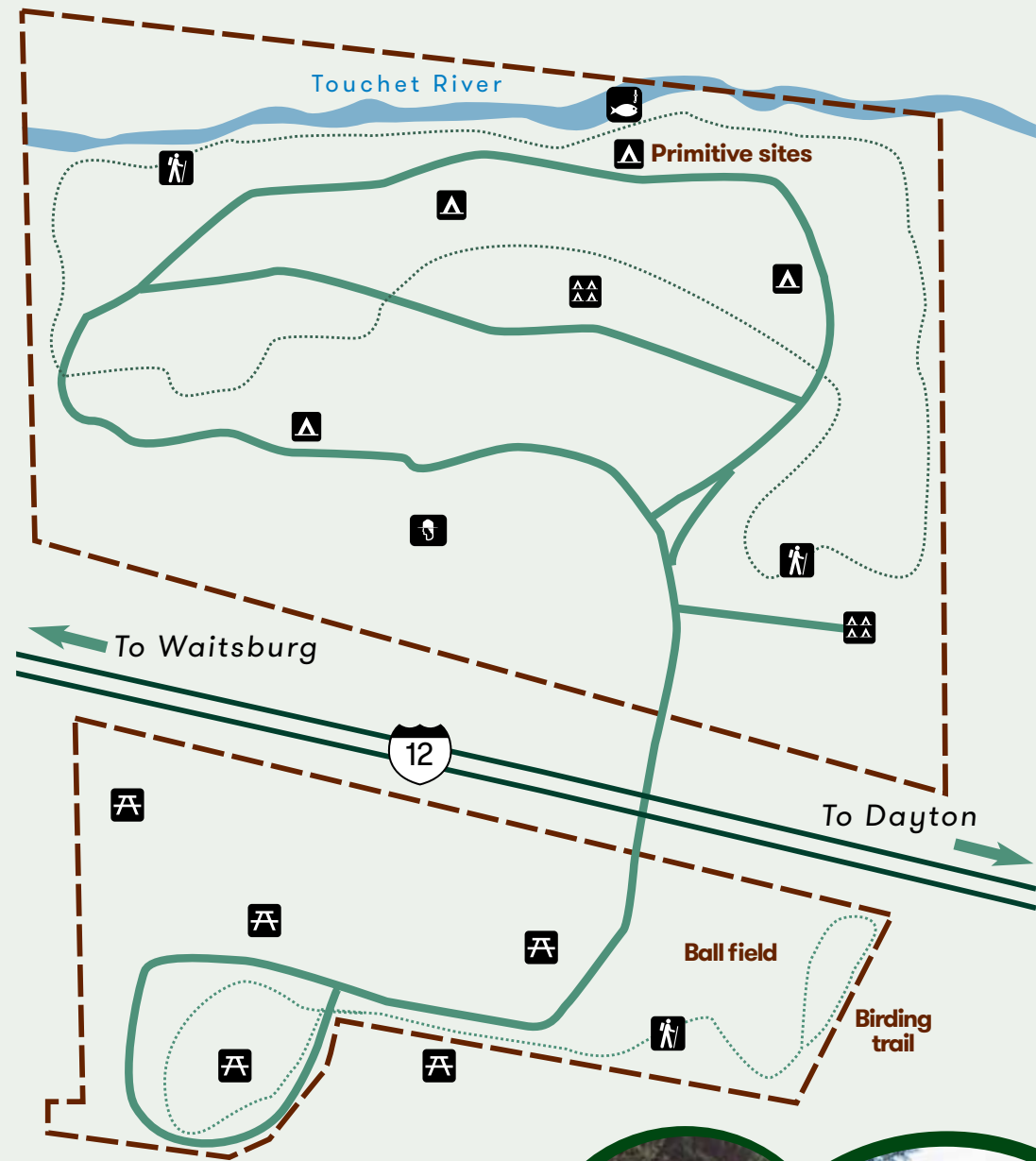
Overnight accommodations

The park offers several options for overnight stays. There are 24 standard campsites available April 1 through Oct. 31. Maximum site length is 50 feet (very limited availability). Between May 15 and Sept. 15, the online reservation system is solely used to reserve standard campsites. From April 1 to May 15 and Sept. 15 to Oct. 31, campsites are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Two group camps that can accommodate approximately 50 people each or 5 RVs also are available. Fees vary by group size. The group camps are available for reservation by calling the park at (509) 337-6457.

Park amenities and facilities

Lewis and Clark Trail State Park offers several amenities and facilities to make your visit more enjoyable and comfortable, including:

- One group day-use kitchen shelter with electricity. Reservable by calling the park at (509) 337-6457.
- 50 unsheltered picnic tables available first come, first served
- One ball field
- 0.8-miles of hiking trail
- Three restrooms and two showers
- Trailer dump station
