

Things to Remember

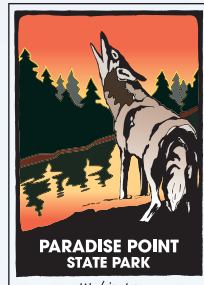
- **Winter Schedule** – Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter.
- For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.state.wa.us, or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited.
- Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m. Generators may be operated from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The **Discover Pass** is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

- Annual pass: \$30
 - One-day pass: \$10
- (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

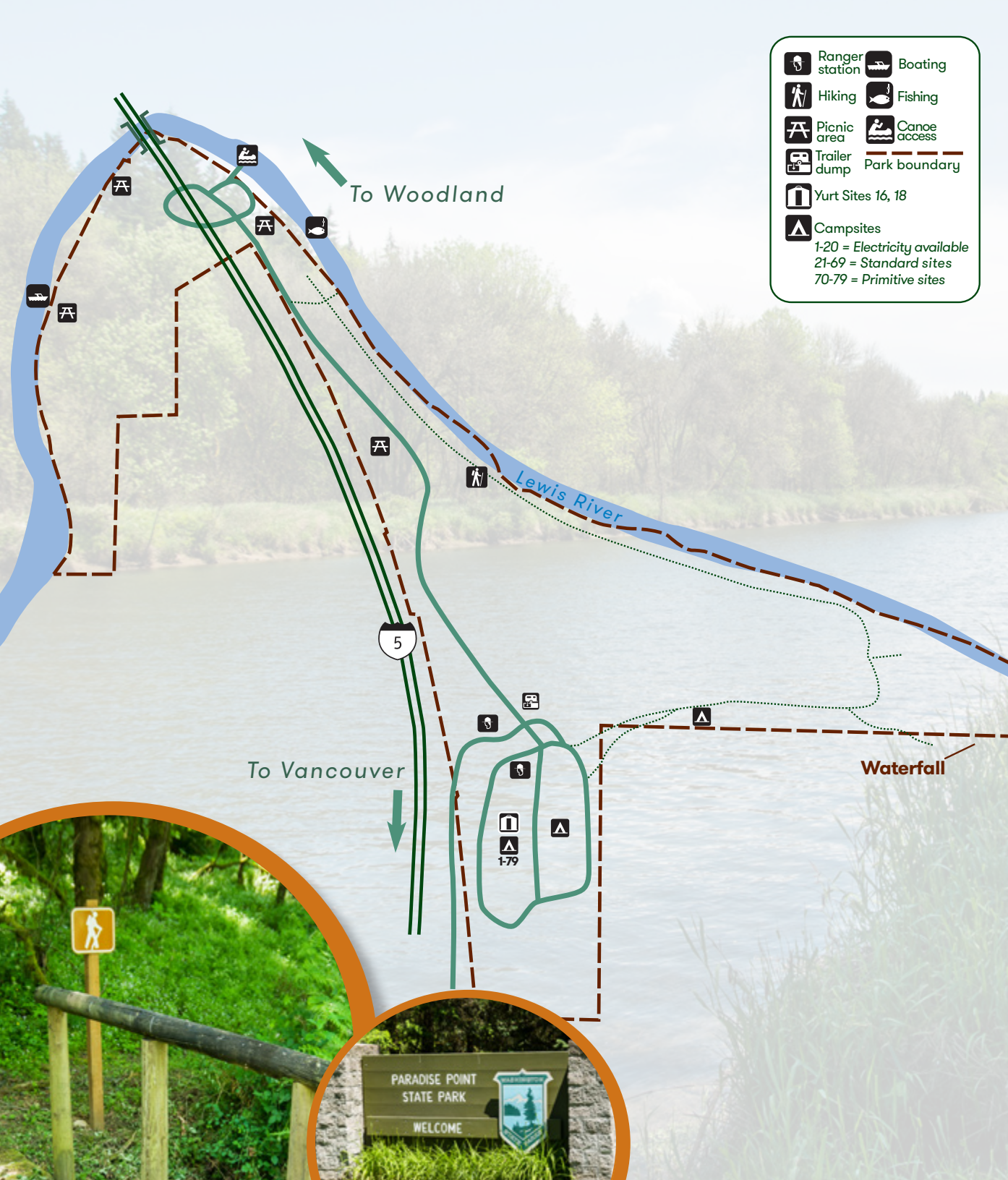

Welcome to Paradise Point

Paradise Point State Park is an 88-acre camping park with 6,180 feet of freshwater shoreline immediately east of the interstate, near Woodland in Southwest Washington.

Paradise Point is forested with Douglas-fir, cedar, alder and hemlock and supports wildlife such as deer, elk, raccoons, chipmunks and coyote. Many types of birds, including dove, hawk, heron, woodpecker and wren can be seen at the park.

Visitors to the park have many recreational opportunities for hiking, bicycling, picnicking, fishing and boating. Swimming in the Lewis River is at visitor's own risk as no lifeguards are on duty. The park has 2 miles of trails and a small apple orchard.

The park, which lies near Interstate 5, offers travelers a camping stop when traveling. The area possesses great natural beauty, and highway noise can be avoided by using woodland campsites in the park.

The park has 18 utility campsites, 49 standard campsites, 10 primitive campsites, two yurts (reservable year round), one dump station, two restrooms, four ADA restrooms and four showers (two ADA). Some of the campsites are in a grassy area, and the primitive sites are in the woods. Maximum site length is 40 feet (limited availability). Campsites may be reserved between May 15 and Sept. 15.
