THINGS TO REMEMBER

- Summer park hours are April 1 to Sept. 30, 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- Winter park hours are Oct. 1 to March 31, 8 a.m. to dusk. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, call the information center at 360-902-8844 or visit <u>parks.wa.gov</u>.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering fire wood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and checkout time is 1 p.m.
- Maximum one vehicle per campsite. Extra vehicle overnight parking is \$10 per night. Extra vehicles to be parked in designated area. Does not apply to vehicle towed by RV.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites.
 Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.

WELCOME TO WALLACE FALLS STATE PARK

Wallace Falls State Park features some of the most scenic areas in western Washington. This 1,380-acre camping park features shoreline on the Wallace River, and Wallace, Jay and Shaw lakes.

Tucked into the west side of the Cascades Mountains, the park features numerous waterfalls. Enjoy views of Middle Wallace Falls (capitalize Middle), which drops from (notice you have an extra space here) a height of 265 feet. The park also has large coniferous forests, backcountry lakes and fast-moving rivers and streams. Opportunities to view local wildlife abound, including peregrine falcons that inhabit the rock cliffs of the Index Town Wall. The park is popular for hiking, mountain biking, wildlife viewing and rock climbing.

AMENITIES + FACILITIES

2 kitchen shelters, one with electricity, one without

OVERNIGHT ACCOMMODATIONS

2 walk-in campsites 20-50 feet from parking area, very private with picnic tables + fire rings. All available on a firstcome, first-served basis.

2 backcountry campsites at Wallace and Jay lakes. Sites require a 4to 7-mile hike and have picnic tables, fire rings and outhouses. All sites are near lakes. Available first-come, first-served.







The park has five reservable cabins with access to Wallace Falls and Wallace Lake. Cabins have covered porch, picnic table, fire ring, electric heat, lights, locking doors, bunk beds that sleep three and a full-size futon bed for two. Cabin C3 and C4 are pet friendly. Two cabins are ADA-accessible.
